

Sports Premium Grant Planned Expenditure (Reviewed)



2023-24



The Primary PE and Sports Premium for schools was introduced in 2013. This government funding is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils.

The school's allocation for 2023-24 was **£17,250**. The focus of our spending was on the delivery of the five key indicators

- Engage all pupils in regular physical activity
- Raise the profile of PE and Sport across the school
- Increase confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE
- Broaden the experiences of sports activities offered to pupils
- Increase participation in competitive sport

Non of the staff employed were PE specialists and they were able to work alongside NUFC staff to boost their confidence, knowledge and skills in subject delivery.</p> <p>KS1/2 children had access to football coaching, multi-skills and dance activities after school.</p> <p>Many of our pupils have SEND with traits of ASD/ADHD and do not cope well in competitive situations which can result in reluctance to participate in PE. Despite this, 97% of children participated in PE lessons every week which covered a range of sports and skills. 100% of children accessed some PE.</p>
<p>Top-up/Extra Swimming Lessons</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To deliver catch up lessons to Year 6 pupils in their final term who have not yet achieved the 25m standard. 	£2,500	<p>This data has not yet been made available by the swimming tuition provider, Active Northumberland at will be added as soon as it is available.</p> <p>Year 6 pupils were able to achieve the following outcomes:</p> <p>..... could swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres</p> <p>..... could use a range of strokes effectively, for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke</p> <p>..... could perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situation at stage 2 (face in the water; ability to float unaided; good kicking ability; independent travel in the water).</p>
<p>Targeted Equipment Purchases, Replacement and Renewal</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To ensure that equipment that is lost or damaged is replaced to ensure children have access to quality resources. • To purchase sporting equipment specifically to promote active playtimes. • To target EY pupils in the development of their gross and fine motor skills following concerns from on entry assessments over the previous two years, 	£3,000	<p>With an increasing number of children starting the EYFS with poorer gross and fine motor skills the main focus of this spending supported the purchase of additional equipment for children to develop their gross motor skills and co-ordination. At the end of Reception 94% achieved the ELG in Gross Motor Skills and 87% in Fine motor skills.</p> <p>The PE Co-ordinator also purchased sport equipment which could be used during playtimes to increase activity and trained older children in the role of play leaders. This particularly increased the activity levels of the UKS2 pupils who have traditionally spent time inactive on the picnic benches. This has also had a positive impact on the co-operative behaviour in younger pupils contributing to the reduction in Red and Yellow cards.</p>
